



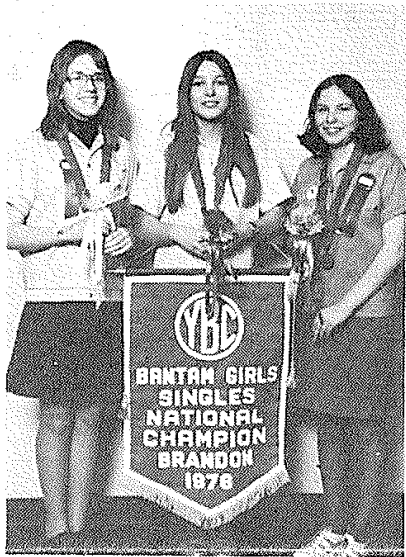

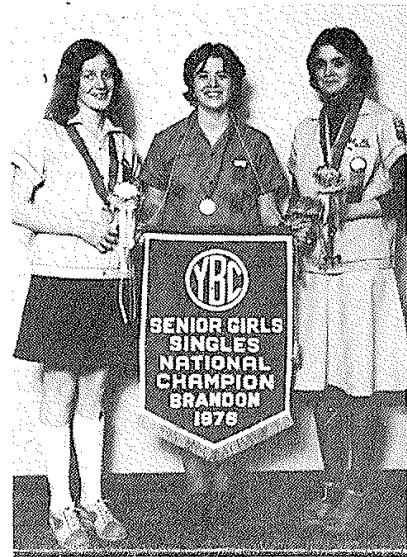

Triple Crown Conquered

In the 12 year history of the Y.B.C. only three singles bowlers have ever attempted to capture the Y.B.C. Triple Crown ... one in 5-pin and two in 10-pin.

Alberta's Marilyn Douglas of Edmonton was the first bowler to attempt this amazing feat having won the Bantam Girls 5-Pin title in 1966 and the Junior Girls crown in 1969 and finishing second in the Senior Girls Division in 1970.

In 1975, the triple crown eluded British Columbia's Ron Allenby of Vancouver who finished second in the 10-pin Senior Boys event after having won the Bantam title in 1971 and the Junior Championship in 1974.

1976 is another story and a year that will go down in the Y.B.C. history book. The "Triple Crown" was finally conquered and the 17-year old lass to do it was Jane Leyes of Waterloo, Ontario who now has a National Championship in all three age divisions to her credit. In 1971 she won the Bantam Girls 10-Pin title followed by the Junior Girls in 1975. Capturing the Senior crown wasn't an easy task for Jane since at the end of the 15-game round robin schedule, she found herself deadlocked in a tie for the Gold Medal with Sue Champagne of Sudbury with 10 wins and 5 losses each. A sudden death one game roll off under a great deal of pressure brought Jane the glory as she emerged the victor 171 to 150.

All of us involved in the Y.B.C., both 5 and 10-pin join together to congratulate Jane on her remarkable accomplishment.



Tears were Evident

It's amazing how much pride one feels for his/her country at moments like this. The 1976 Y.B.C. Perhaps the most emotional moment came at the Victory Banquet when the youngest bowler in the competition, 10 year old, Ian Marten from Barrie, Ontario, took to the public address system like a true professional and presented a dozen red roses on behalf of all the competitors to Susan Peters, wife of Host Proprietor, Alex.

A Gold Medal in Both Games

Most people, at one time or another, try their luck at both 5 and 10-pin bowling and will readily admit that the two games are uniquely different. They could be compared to softball and fastball ... slalom skiing and downhill skiing. Very seldom does one excel in both and very rarely does one accomplish the ultimate goal of winning a Canadian Championship in both sports.

David Rosenbaum from Estevan, Saskatchewan is undoubtedly an exception to the rule. In 1975, he won the Junior Boys Singles 5-Pin Championship only to come back this year to win the gold medal in the Junior Boys 10-Pin Event.

It's never been done before in Y.B.C. history and just one more amazing feat for the record book.

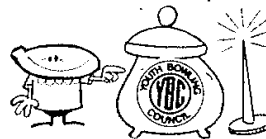


A Perfect Game for Two Y.B.C. Seniors

In the month of March, two Y.B.C. Seniors accomplished the 5-pin bowler's dream ... "a perfect 450 game". 16 Year old Kelly Akai of Commodore Lanes in Vancouver, B.C. performed this feat on March 6th, 1976 as he strung together games of 217, 320 and 450 for a 987 triple. In

the eastern part of the country, 17 year old John Metcalfe of Power Lanes in Willowdale, Ontario combined games of 280, 450 and 308 on March 27th for a 1038 triple.
